Science Week:

During Science Week, the children have been working scientifically to conduct different enquiries linked to biscuits and The Gingerbread Man! Following on from lockdown, we noticed that children did not have the opportunity to work scientifically, so this is why working scientifically was the main focus of the week. Children have been conducting enquiries, making observations, recording results, presenting results and from this they have then developed further enquiries and taken the lead in their own investigations to create new scientific questions for things they would like to find out.

Children in EYFS, Year 1 and 2 read The Gingerbread Man and found out what would happen to The Gingerbread Man if he decided to swim across the river rather than jump onto the fox's back. KS2 have been investigating which biscuit is the best dunker, which temperature is best to dunk biscuits and they have also been thinking about whether the properties of a biscuit affect its dunking ability, e.g. sugar content or thickness!

Pupils have also discussed and researched the different jobs that scientists do. A reminder that there are a number of science investigations which have been posted on Class Dojo for you to try and home with your children.

'We have been experimenting with biscuits. We found out that the oaty biscuit with jam in the middle was the best because oats don't break up easily' (Theo C, Y1)

'We found out which biscuit was best to dunk. The one which had the most number of dunks was the best – it was the chocolate digestive!' (Tilly S, Y3)

Science week has been really fun – it has been fun finding out about jobs that involve science like a sound engineer or an astronaut. We dunked biscuits – soapy water can make the biscuit last longer!' (Laila K, Y5)

On Thursday of this week, it was wonderful to see pupils from Year 5 leading Collective Worship related to Fair Trade. Pupils explored the word FAIRNESS during the worship and how this relates to Fairtrade.


Reading Recommendations:
